MEPPI III Initiative


Nora Kennedy travelled to Rabat, Morocco in October 2016 to teach an advanced workshop for the Middle East Photograph Preservation Initiative (MEPPI), focused on the environment and exhibition of photographs. Photograph collection keepers from six countries in North Africa, the Gulf, and the Eastern Mediterranean were hosted at the *Bibliothèque Nationale du Royaume du Maroc*, a state-of-the-art facility where sessions on testing for mold, housing collections for freezer storage, and creating custom housings from local materials were conducted over the course of two weeks. Now in its seventh year, MEPPI has trained more than 60 professionals throughout the region, built online resources, and supported a network of photograph preservation enthusiasts. Many thanks to our generous Moroccan hosts, to the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, and to our partners at the Getty Conservation Institute for this important segment of the MEPPI.





Time-based Media Lecture Series

This fall, our neighbors at NYU's Institute of Fine Arts organized the *Topics in Time-based Media Art Conservation* lecture series, featuring an array of speakers across disciplines to share their knowledge and experiences working with time-based media art. After hearing from artists, curators, professors, conservators, and computer scientists, the series culminated in a presentation by Joanna Phillips (pictured), Senior Conservator of Time-based Media at the Guggenheim Museum, which we were thrilled to co-host here at The Met. A pioneer at her institution, Joanna discussed the challenges of establishing a fully equipped time-based media conservation program at the Guggenheim, an endeavor that the Met hopes to accomplish in the near future. Article in Revue de l'Art

In an issue devoted to conservation, the prestigious French journal *Revue de l'Art* published "Current Trends in Photograph Conservation", co-authored by Peter Mustardo and Nora Kennedy, representing private practice and institutional conservation practices respectively. The article touches upon changes in the field with the demise of analog photographic materials; the changing views on the 'vintage print' and on print replication in the art world; and on approaches to preventive care and conservation treatment. The tremendous growth and developing sophistication of the field of photograph conservation is also celebrated, along with an acknowledgement of the considerable challenges of emerging media.

Intern Spotlight: Natasha Kung

Natasha Kung joined the Department as an intern in September 2016. Natasha studied art history and chemistry at NYU, where she earned her Bachelor's degree this past spring. She has interned in the conservation departments at the Museum of Modern Art, the Central Park Conservancy, and the Brooklyn Museum, and has worked at the Barbara Goldsmith Conservation and Preservation Laboratory at NYU's Bobst Library. Throughout the fall she has undertaken a variety of projects, including identifying, documenting, and cataloging photographs in our Study Collection, and is also learning about various analytical techniques and photographic processes.
