Adrienne Lundgren shares insights on F. Holland Day

Adrienne Lundgren, Senior Photograph Conservator at the Library of Congress, recently spent two days in the Department of Photograph Conservation studying The Met's holdings of Pictorialist photographer F. Holland Day. The Met's collection represents the third largest of his work in the world. During her visit, Ms. Lundgren was able to examine all 46 prints in the collection, adding observations about them to her extensive database on the artist. The Lundgren database now comprises 803 records, a true technical catalogue raisonné. Lundgren's research significantly deepens our understanding of Day's working methods and has led to reattribution and more precise dating in some cases. The Met supports and benefits from this type of research and scholarship. Many thanks to our donors who make these collaborations possible!

MEPPI Symposium in Beirut

In celebration of more than a decade of the Middle East Photograph Preservation Initiative, or MEPPI (www.meppi.me), the Arab Image Foundation organized the symposium *The Photographic Legacy of the Middle East and North Africa: Priorities for Sustainability*, hosted by the Sursock Museum in Beirut, Lebanon on May 3-4, 2017. The 14O attendees from 16 countries across North Africa, the Arabian Peninsula, and the Eastern Mediterranean included alumni of MEPPI courses, directors of MEPPI-affiliated institutions, and colleagues from a variety of organizations that support the preservation of cultural heritage.

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During the symposium, participants reflected upon the progress made by the initiative, learned of related efforts in the field, and considered how to advance and sustain the practice of photograph preservation for the region and continue the many benefits of the MEPPI network into the future. Photographs from the event are now available on MEPPI's Facebook page, and talks that were given during the symposium will soon be available on MEPPI's newly launched YouTube channel.

The symposium marks a period of transition from a partner-supported to a regionally-based initiative. A new Steering Committee composed of MEPPI alumni have leadership roles in growing and sustaining this vital regional network with the help of the entire MEPPI family. The plan will focus on designing future workshops, coordinating meetings and exchanges, sourcing local materials, sponsoring exhibitions, producing publications, and fostering collaborations that continue to secure and promote photograph collections throughout the region. MEPPI family members have expressed sincere appreciation for the initiative's success at bringing together individuals without regard for race, religion, nationality, or gender, toward one positive goal: the preservation of cultural heritage. We have much to celebrate indeed!

Pre-Program Conservation Internships

The pathway to becoming a conservator is potentially long and arduous, but leads to an exciting and rewarding career. Graduate degree-granting programs only accept between four and ten candidates per year. Prerequisites include coursework in art history, studio art, and chemistry along with experience gained through practical internships. Every academic semester, the Department of Photograph Conservation takes on a 'pre-program intern' who has the opportunity to work with each of the conservators on a range of projects before applying to a graduate program. The intern gains a holistic understanding of how the department functions on its own and in collaboration with other colleagues throughout the Museum. Interns are tasked with projects such as exhibition preparation, preventive conservation, and database management. Independent research is encouraged on topics such as the technical history of photographic processes, analytical techniques, and contemporary conservation issues. Mentoring extends to preparations for graduate school interviews and compliation of the all-important portfolio. It is a rewarding experience to follow the progress of former interns through graduate school and on into their successful careers.
