I am going to [World Culture Festival](#) at The Metropolitan Museum of Art today.

I can explore the Museum all afternoon while watching [performances](#), having fun with [stories](#), and [making art](#), both inside and outside the Museum.

I can also take a break in quiet galleries.

I can find all the activities in the [schedule of events](#) available at the [welcome table](#) in Burke Hall, located inside the Museum's entrance at Fifth Avenue and 81st Street (Ruth and Harold D. Uris Center for Education, one block south of the main entrance).

Museum staff at the welcome table can provide more information on accessibility accommodations.

I can join any activity listed in the [schedule of events](#). I can use the [Museum Map](#) in the schedule of events to help me find activities, restrooms, and quiet galleries. I can also ask a security guard to help me find my way around.

Outside the Museum



I will see **performers** dancing on David H. Koch Plaza. I can **make art** with other visitors.

I will hear music and rhythmical beats, as well as other visitors talking. If it gets too loud or crowded, I can go inside the Museum to **Galleries 163–168, Leon Levy and Shelby White Court, Greek and Roman Art on the First Floor**, or **Galleries 208 and 233, Arthur M. Sackler Gallery, Asian Art on the Second Floor**, the designated quiet spaces in the Museum (see the Museum Map). Or I can go to nearby Central Park.

Inside the Museum



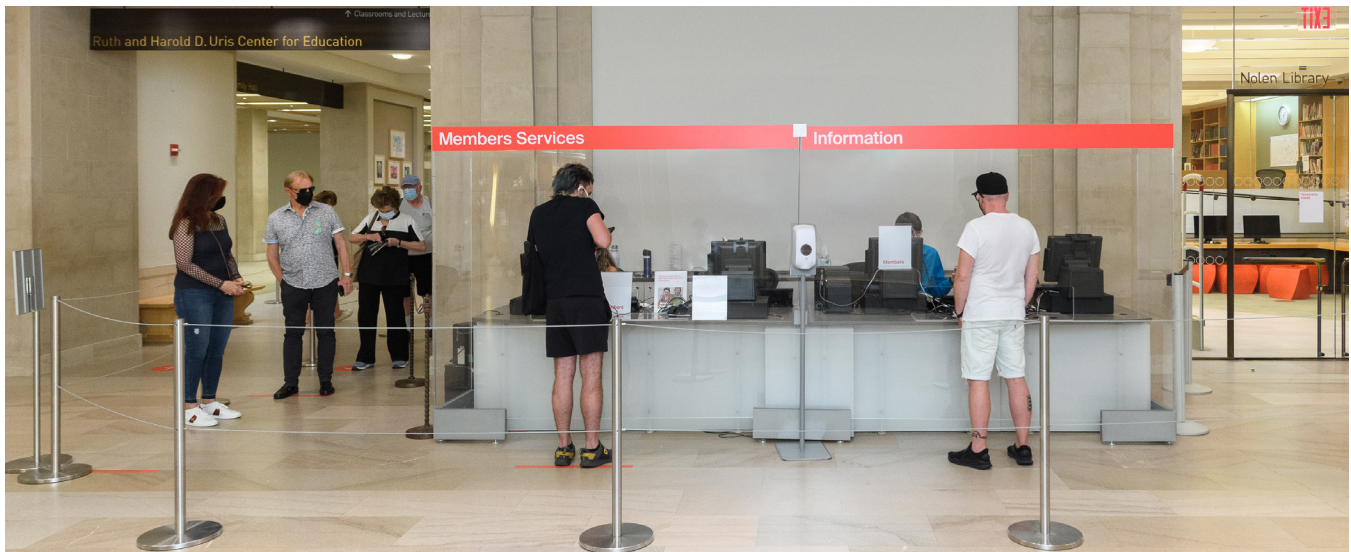
I will enter the Museum through the entrance at **81st Street and Fifth Avenue**. I might see a long line of people waiting to enter the Museum.



Inside the entrance, I will pass through a metal detector. If there is anything made from metal in my bag or pocket, I will hear a short beeping sound.



A security guard will ask to look in my bag. I will open my bag so that the guard can look inside.



Next, I will pay admission to enter the Museum. Sometimes there is a line at the Admissions Desk. I may need to wait for a few minutes.



The person at the Admissions Desk will give me a sticker that shows I have paid to enter the Museum. I will peel it from the backing and put it on my clothing in a visible place.



Inside the Museum, I can make art and talk to Museum experts. I can even learn new dances.

When I go to an activity or performance, I can say hello to a staff member and they will give me more information or instructions on how to get started.



I can join a Storytime session to listen, sing, and have fun with picture books. Many of these activities I can attend will be offered in other languages.

I hope I can visit the Museum again soon and see more art!
